GENERAL RULES

1. Each student enrolled in the Agriculture Science class is encouraged to join the National FFA Organization. Dues of \$40 must be paid by the deadline set in October. Students that do not join FFA are not eligible to participate in any FFA activity, judging contest, and/or any livestock shows. Dues are non-refundable after the student completes the membership form.

2. All FFA meeting will be based upon democratic principles as outlined in "Parliamentary Guide for FFA," by Jarrell D. Gray, and the FFA manual.

3. Hauling of livestock shall be arranged by the Ag Science Instructors.

4. Students may NOT enter the teacher's office if the instructor is out, or without permission.

5. Scheduled workdays will be determined at the beginning of each school year.

6. Shop safety procedures will always be enforced for all individuals that enter the shop

LIVESTOCK AND HORTICULTURE PROJECTS

When selecting a project, it is critical that the student have the parents' advice and support. There are many things to consider:

1. Can the student and/or parent afford the project?

2. Where the project will be kept?

3. Transportation to feed and care for the animal

4. Transportation for the animal when necessary

5. Time involved

6. Risk of losing money

You must keep in mind that these projects are a gamble and they can become a total loss. The gamble can be reduced by hard work and desire to learn and apply your knowledge.

PROJECT REQUIREMENTS

The animal(s) purchased for students' projects must be an animal designated for either breeding or slaughter purposes. In addition, please refer to the facility rules.

Family domestic animals do not meet the required project criteria.

The types of projects are as follows:

MARKET: steers, lambs, goats, swine, turkeys, chickens

BREEDING: chickens and rabbits

PLANT/HORTICULTURE: green house plants, garden crops (Projects involving crops that will be sold need to be approved by the agriculture teacher) AG MECHANICS: All ag mechanics projects must be approved by the ag mechanics teacher(s)

THIS SUPERVISED PROJECT CAN BE A DREADFUL PROBLEM OR THE GREATEST LEARNING EXPERIENCE. IT IS ONLY WHAT YOU MAKE IT!

PURCHASE OF PROJECT

1. The selection and purchase of an agriculture science project is a cooperative effort involving the student, parent, and teacher. The agriculture science teacher's role is advisory only.

2. The student and parent are responsible for the purchase of any and all agriculture science projects.

3. Projects purchased for the purpose of showing must meet the requirements of the show(s) intended. The agriculture science teacher will assist in providing the student and parent the necessary information regarding the care and grooming of the projects for each show.

4. All projects must be owned by the student

5. The student is responsible for validations and entries at all shows.

6 The students and parents will make arrangements for transportation when selecting projects.

Recommendations for Feeding and Care of Animals

The feeding and care of the animals is a very important aspect of the livestock project. Many authorities believe it as important as purchasing a high-quality animal. All authorities believe it is responsible for at least 50% of the success or failure of a project.

Below is a list of several proven practices which if done consistently, will lead to success in the show ring.

Daily Care/Feeding

The daily routine of feeding and care is very important. All animals respond well to an organized routine. They should be fed twice daily in most cases. Normally this will require at least 30 minutes in the morning and 30 minutes in the evening (6:00-7:00 a.m. and 3:00-6:00 p.m. at the school farm.) Your feeding program will be tailored to your particular animal as recommended by your ag science teacher. Your choice of feeds will be up to you based upon your particular situation. It is best to discuss with the ag. science teacher the feeding program

you are going to use.

Halter Breaking or Teaching the Animal to Lead

One of the more important considerations that arise early in the feeding period is teaching the calf, lamb, goat or hog to lead. The animal must be worked daily. This is no easy task and sometimes can be very time consuming. Consistency is the key. Some animals learn more quickly than others do, but normally this can be accomplished in the first several weeks. The animal must also be trained to stand correctly and calmly. This is critical, as in some cases the judge may want to handle the animal. This practice will require several additional hours each week.

Disease Prevention

Your animal's pen must be kept clean on a DAILY basis. This will help reduce fly problems and help in keeping the animal clean and healthy. Regular worming for internal parasites and vaccinations for more serious diseases is recommended. A close examination of your animal's feces, appetite, and attitude can help you assess its general health.

Weighing on a Regular Basis

Knowing your animals' weight and weighing on a regular basis is very important. Weight gain or loss is a good indicator of how well the animal is progressing/regressing. Animals should be weighed as often as feasible. It is particularly important near show time, as weight limits and weight classes are sometimes critical to placing the animal. It is also important to know the minimum and maximum weight limits for the species you are showing and the show you are entering.

Grooming Livestock for the Show

During the latter part of the feeding period, much time must be devoted to grooming the animal. Brushing and combing your animal are important daily routines. Washing and clipping will also be done on regular intervals to get a good view of how the animal is growing and progressing. In most cases, all animals will be clipped prior to the show to meet maximum hair requirements of the show that you are enterina.

USE OF DRUG PROCURING AND MEDICATION
The agriculture teacher or the Klein Independent School District will not be held liable for injury to livestock or poultry while assisting the student with their project. This includes such things as giving medication, castration, dehorning, docking, worming, trimming, and any other activity directly involving the agriculture science teacher with student's animals.
Important Notice
It is strictly prohibited to administer any type of vaccine, drug, spray, feed additive, or substance
internally or externally without first receiving approval of the vet/ag science teacher. All students are expected to read and agree to abide by the Animal Welfare Agreement.
DNA Testing
The purpose of DNA testing is to support the validity of ownership of the animal.
A. An initial hair sample will be collected from each animal (steer, lamb, goat and swine) at the time of
the selection process. Exhibitors must remain with their animal during the collection process.
B. A legal guardian needs to be present when the sample is taken. If a legal guardian cannot be
present a waiver form must accompany the student and be presented to show officials. Forms
may be obtained from the Agriscience Teacher.
C. The hair samples will be sealed in a tamper-proof envelope identified by the animal's ear tag
number. The hair sample collection process will be facilitated by the Klein ISD FFA Show
Committee, Inc. designee.
D. The initial hair samples will be stored under the supervision of the Klein ISD FFA Show Committee,
Inc. (Show Committee)
E. The Show Committee reserves the right to initiate a DNA comparison test on any animal in the steer,
lamb, goat, and swine divisions if ownership is in question (i.e. when an ear tag is lost or there is a
question of tampering).
F. If someone outside of the Show Committee wishes to submit a protest of ownership, it must be made
with specific reasoning in writing, along with \$250 cash, to the Klein ISD FFA Show Committee, Inc. The
protest will be reviewed and considered by the Show Committee. If the protest is accepted, the \$250
cash collected from the person protesting will be used, in part, to pay for the DNA testing. The \$250 fee
will be refunded if the protest proves to be valid (DNA does not match initial sample).
G. If the owner refuses the collection of the initial DNA sample or a sample to be compared to the initial
sample, or if the sample comes back from testing and it does not match the initial DNA sample, the
entry is disqualified and the exhibitor forfeits all awards and all sale money (auction, freezer, add-ons)
collected through the Show Committee. In addition, any future Klein ISD FFA Livestock and Project
Show entries of this exhibitor are subject to DNA testing.
Drug Residue Avoidance Policy
A. Klein ISD FFA Livestock & Project Show maintains a Zero Tolerance Policy, which means if positive
results are reported, we have an obligation to investigate.
Zero Tolerance is based on the elimination period, rather than the withdrawal period.
The withdrawal period is the amount of time that must pass for consumed products to be safe. The
elimination period is the amount of time it takes for all residue to be eliminated from an animal's
system. For most drugs, the elimination period is longer than the withdrawal period.
Unapproved drugs are prohibited.

Unapproved means not approved by the Food and Drug Administration and/or the U.S. Department
of Agriculture for slaughter animals that may be destined for human consumption. This includes the
use of all products that are not FDA approved including but not limited to any diuretic, unapproved
growth stimulant or other unapproved medication meant for human usage.
NOTE: Products labeled "all natural" that are not FDA approved may contain ingredients that can
result in a positive test.
B. Drug residue testing: Exhibitors and guardians consent and agree that any market entries may, at the
discretion of the Show Committee, be tested for unauthorized use of medications or drugs. They further
certify that they will not administer their market entry with any substance not approved by the FDA and/or
USDA for this species. (For example, they will not give a substance labeled as a swine feed supplement
to poultry.) Their entry is not, nor will it be, within any elimination or withdrawal time relative to the
administration of any drug, chemical, or feed additive approved by the FDA and / or USDA by the time
the animal(s) is officially checked-in by the Show Committee. As a condition for participation in the show,
every exhibitor must agree to submit their animal(s) for testing at any time after check in. The Show
Committee reserves the right to perform any test, including but not limited to tissue, feather, blood and /
or urine laboratory analysis, on the Grand and Reserve champions, along with a random group of
animals from each division. Random selections will be drawn prior to exhibition of the projects and
posted for the exhibitors The Show Committee President, Klein ISD Career & Technical Education (CTE)
Director, and KISD CTE Coordinator for Agriscience will do the random drawing. The exhibitor and
his/her guardian must be present during the collection for testing and must witness the sample; thus
verifying the sample to be properly collected and prepared for analysis. The Show Committee reserves
the right to condemn and / or disqualify any animal, either alive or dead, found in violation of the use of
any drug, chemical, or feed additive as described above and the exhibitor will forfeit all awards and sale
proceeds and be subject to testing at future Klein ISD FFA Livestock and Project Show. If an animal is
disqualified for testing positive and/or the carcass condemned at slaughter, the disqualification will not
impact class or overall placing for that species.
C. If a sample tests positive for illegal drug residue during the preliminary test, the guardian / exhibitor has
the right to request a second test to confirm the results. The second sample taken from the same animal
will then be sent to the state testing lab for further testing. The guardian / exhibitor will be responsible in
advance for all costs associated with this second test. Should the results of the second test not confirm
the findings in the first test, the cost of the test (minus shipping and handling) will be refunded.
Knowledge of this pending information will only be made available to the Klein ISD CTE Director, Klein
ISD CTE Coordinator, Agriscience Instructor and the two officers Show Committee for privacy purposes
only.
D. Emergency Treatment: If an animal requires emergency treatment while on the Show grounds, only a
licensed veterinarian with the prior approval of the Show Committee will be allowed to administer a
drug, chemical, or feed additive. Treatment Cost: All treatment costs are the responsibility of the
exhibitor.
E. Exhibitors refusing to submit their animal/pen for drug testing will be disqualified and must
remove their animal/pen from the show grounds immediately.
F. Ultimate Care and Responsibility: By making entry into the Klein ISD FFA Livestock and Project
Show, the exhibitor agrees and understands that ultimate care and responsibility for an animal /
pen rest solely upon the exhibitor until such time that possession of the animal is turned over to
the buyer and/or his agent(s).

a. Document all treatment records: If the animal is treated with an ap	proved drug and

G. Exhibitors are encouraged to stay with their animal / pen during th	e hours that the Klein ISD Multipurpose				
Center is open. No one other than the Klein ISD Police Department a	and Klein ISD representatives will be				
allowed in the Klein ISD Multipurpose Center when it is closed. The S	Show Committee is not responsible				
for the acts of third parties.					

LIVESTOCK SHOW PARTICIPATION

1. Each student may choose to show or not to show his/her project. This is not an agriculture science course requirement

2. To show a project, a student must be a member of the FFA Chapter and enrolled in an agriculture science class.

3. In order to participate in a livestock, show, students must be passing all courses as determined by TEA rules.

4. Each exhibitor must pass Quality Counts by November in order to be eligible to show.

5. The agriculture science teacher will prepare an approved list of eligible students authorized to attend all livestock shows.

6. The parents and student will make arrangements with the agriculture teacher for supervision, travel, housing and transportation of animals to the major shows in which students enter as a team.

7. Students and parents will be responsible for travel to and from livestock shows and for transporting their animals to and from these shows, unless prior arrangements have been made.

8. School policies will be enforced and discipline will be according to school policies

9. Students who are released from school to go to stock shows as an FFA member, whether supervised or not, must follow school rules or forfeit the right to participate in future shows.

EQUIPMENT AND TRAILER USE

Arrangements must be made for the use of any equipment belonging to the FFA. Clippers, blowers, etc. must be cleaned and returned in a diligent manner so that others may be able to use them. The use of the livestock trailer will be limited to the agricultural science teachers. Any equipment lost, stolen or destroyed while in the possession of a student will be replaced at the expense of the student.

CONTEST CONTRACT

GENERAL RULES:

1. Students must attend all monthly meetings and will not miss more than 2 meetings unless prior approval from designated coach(advisor).

2. Students must actively participate in ALL fundraising events throughout the year.

3. Students must be eligible according to UIL standards. "No pass, no play."

4. LDE and Fall CDE students must be enrolled in one agricultural science class. CDE, Speaking and Agriscience Fair students must be enrolled in one spring agricultural science class.

5. All students competing in any form of LDE contest will need to be in Official Dress with the exception of Ag Demonstration. Ag Demonstration will need to be in matching collared shirts, jeans, closed toed shoes approved by advisor Students competing in CDE will need to be in a collard shirt, bootcut jeans (no holes/rips) and closed toed shoes. Vet Science contestants will need to be in matching scrubs outlined in the Texas FFA State Rules. FBM and Ag Sales students will need to be in official dress. All speaking and agriscience contestants will wear official dress

6. All school policies and student code of conduct will be in effect on ALL trips. Any violoation could terminate a student from participating in future events.

PRACTICE(S)

Each event will have practices at designated days/times. Practices will be set by the advisor leading the team.

The student must attend 80% of the practices scheduled by the instructor/coach.

The student will return flashcards supplied by team Advisor, the cost of the supplies will be charged to the students for failure to return.

INVITATIONALS:

Invitationals can occur after school, evenings, weekends, fall and mid-winter breaks. It is an expectation of students to attend with their team.

Teams are permitted to travel to invitational contest(s) throughout the year. However, once a team has traveled to 5 contest, any additional contest(s) will be paid by the team and its members.

Example: Entry fee is \$30 with four members per team 30/4=\$7.50 per team member

In the event a student fails to attend or becomes ineligible for an invitational contest they agreed to attend, the student is responsible for refunding the chapter the cost of the student's entry fee and travel expenses. These range from \$15.00-\$65.00.

a. If the student's failure to attend the invitational contest causes forfeiture of the team, the student will be held responsible for the cost of the team entry and travel expenses. These could range from \$25.00 - \$100.00. The Student will not be allowed to travel until the student refunds the chapter*.

CDE team members that consistently show progress in event practices and quizzes as the top team members will be the advancing members to move forward to the next level, which is Area 3 CDE contest held in the Spring.

QUALIFYING CONTESTS:

Area & State qualifying contest(s) entry fees will be paid by the school district.

If the student qualifies to participate at the area or state level contest and fails to attend or becomes ineligible they will be placed on a one year probation from competing on any FFA team and be responsible for refunding the chapter the cost of the student's entry fee and travel expenses, as well as cost of previously attended contest. Each of these may range from \$15.00-\$65.00.

a. If the student's failure to attend causes forfeiture of the team, the student will be held responsible for the cost of the team's entry and travel expenses as well as the cost of the team's previously attended contest. These fees could range from \$300.00 to \$750.00 and the student will not be allowed to travel until the student refunds the chapter*.

UNEXCUSED ABSENCE FROM CONTEST

Members must pay \$10 to your advisor in order to be registerd for the contest. When you load on district transportation the morning of the contest, YOU WILL GET THIS MONEY BACK. If you "No call, no show" (ie slept in, didn't feel good, didn't feel like going) you will not get this money back. Last minute circumstances will be evaluated by the advisors
